

Beanie Baby

Grow a soybean in a plastic bag

Materials:

Jewelry size resealable bag (found in craft section) Crystal Soil (found in garden center) Hole Punch Water Measuring spoons Soybeans Yarn

- 1. Punch a hole in the top of your bag.
- 2. Place a scant 1/4 teaspoon of Crystal Soil into bag.
- 3. Add one tablespoon of water.
- 4. Gently push in two soybeans.
- 5. Seal your bag firmly.
- 6. Insert the yarn to make a necklace.
- 7. Wear your Beanie Baby around your neck and under your shirt to keep it in a warm, dark place.
- 8. Check your Beanie Baby several times a day for germination and record the growth.

Pigs Materials:


-One sandwich size Ziploc® bag

-Peanuts

- -Raisins
- -Multi-Colored Candy
- -Peanut Butter Candy
- Copy the pig feed sack chart below and insert the paper into your Ziploc[®] bag.
- 2. Add the blue/white/silver candy, toasted oat cereal, peanuts, raisins, multi-colored candy, and peanut butter candy to the bag.
- Tell a friend what pigs eat and how the things in your Ziploc[®] bag represent what pigs eat.
- 4. Enjoy your feed sack snack!

Ingredients:

Milk or half & half (2 oz. for each student) Vanilla extract or chocolate syrup


Sugar (1 tsp. per student)

Ice

Salt

Plastic Ziploc bags (snack, quart and gallon size) Newspapers

Spoons



- 1. Put 2 oz. milk, 1 tsp sugar, a dash of vanilla or $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. of chocolate syrup in each snack size bag for each child.
- 2. Seal the bags and squish everything around to mix it up.
- 3. Place bag in quart size bag and seal.
- 4. Put three bags in a gallon bag and fill about halfway with ice and $\frac{3}{4}$ to 1 cup of salt.
- 5. Then wrap the large bag up in newspaper and twist the ends.
- 6. Have two students grab each end and shake the roll for about 5 minutes or until the ice cream is just right.
- 7. Pass out spoons and each child enjoys their own ice cream.
- 8. Serve plain or top with nuts and sprinkles.

Pumpkin Patch Pie

An easy-to-make, easy-to-clean-up fall recipe

Materials:

1 gallon Ziploc freezer bag

2 2/3 cups cold milk

2 packages (4 serving size) instant vanilla pudding mix

1 can (15 oz.) solid pack pumpkin

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

Graham cracker crumbs

25 small cups


scissors

1 can whipped topping

25 spoons bag.

- 2. Remove the air and Ziploc shut.
- 3. Squeeze and kneed with hands until blended for 1 minute.
- 4. Add the pumpkin, cinnamon, and ginger.
- 5. Remove the air and Ziploc shut.
- 6. Squeeze and kneed with hands until blended for 2 minutes.
- 1. Combine the milk and instant pudding in Ziploc
- 7. Place 1/2 tablespoon of graham cracker crumbs in bottom of small cups.
- 8. Cut corner of gallon freezer bag and squeeze pie filling into cups.
- 9. Garnish with whipped topping.
- 10. Add a spoon. Serve and enjoy.
- 11. Discuss pumpkin production while students are eating.

Cornbread in a Bag

An easy lesson to teach children there is a direct link between food they eat and agriculture.

Materials:

1 cup cornmeal

1 cup all-purpose flour

4 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 eggs

1 cup milk

1/4 oil

1. Combine the first four ingredients in a large Ziploc bag.

2. Close the bag and mix well by working bag with fingers,

3. Add the final three ingredients.

4. Mix well by working bag with fingers.

5. Open the bag and pour mixture into a 9"x9" pan.

6. Bake at 400 degrees for 25 minutes.

Also, you might want to make homemade butter to serve with this. An easier version would be to use a package of cornbread mix.



Bag Butterflies

Make a butterfly with a Ziploc bag.

Materials:

Colored construction paper,confetti,cellophane,or tissue paper Sandwich size Ziploc bags

Black pipe cleaners

- Your butterfly will be made by filling a ziploc bag with colored construction paper, confetti, cellophane, or tissue paper. If you are using paper or cellophane, cut or tear it into small pieces.
- 2. Place the paper, cellophane, or confetti into the bag. Leave about an inch of the bag unfilled.
- 3. Seal the bag and fold the unfilled portion of the bag to the back of your butterfly.
- 4. Wrap a black pipe cleaned around the middle of your bag and twist it at the top. Shape the pipe cleaner to make it look like antennae.

Mud In a Bag

Serves six

1 package (6 oz.) instant chocolate pudding mix

3 cups cold milk


6 whole graham crackers

seeds (peanuts, M & M's, sunflower seeds)

6 gummy worms

- 2 1 gallon Ziploc bags
- 1. Crush the graham crackers in a Ziploc bag. Set aside.
- 2. Combine pudding and milk in Ziploc bag. Remove air.
- 3. Squeeze and kneed with hands until well blended about 3 minutes.
- 4. Cut corner off bag and pour in small cups.
- 5. Top with graham crackers.
- 6. Dig holes for seeds and gummy worms.




Chicken Feed In a Bag
